

1798 - M - 1800

To His Excellency Peter Hunter Esq^{re} Lieut. Governor of the Province
of Upper Canada & commander in chief of His Majesty's forces in the
two Provinces & & &

In Council

The Petition of Samuel Martin, late of the State New York - Farmer

Humbly shewith -

That your Petitioner came into the Province in March
last with his family, consisting of a wife and nine Children, all of whom
are now at his Brother-in-Law, Samuel Baker, in the Township of Burford;
That your Petitioner has taken the oath of allegiance, and is desirous
to become a bona fide settler in the Province; he therefore humbly prays
your Excellency to grant him Lot No. 20 - on Dundas Street in the Eastern
Division of Oxford River Thames, on the usual terms of settlement; and
your Petitioner, as in duty Bound shall ever pray

These may certify that Samuel Martin (the Bearer) has resided in this
Country since March last, during which time he has behaved himself as an
honest, sober and Industrious inhabitant and has this day made Oath of
his Allegiance to his Majesty and signed the declaration before me.
